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Ad building plans scrapped, new Clock Tower to be built

Plans for a new administration building at Union College have been scrapped due to lack of need, Dr. H. R. Beige, President, recently revealed.

Dr. Beige said he had been bothered for some time by the thought of spending nearly \$2 million dollars on a new administration building that wasn't really needed. After much careful consideration of the matter, Beige, who reportedly holds a Ph. D. in Casuistry, decided that he had a moral obligation to bring this matter before the Board of Trustees.

At the Board of Trustees meeting held in early March, Dr. Beige stated his conviction forcefully to the trustees. 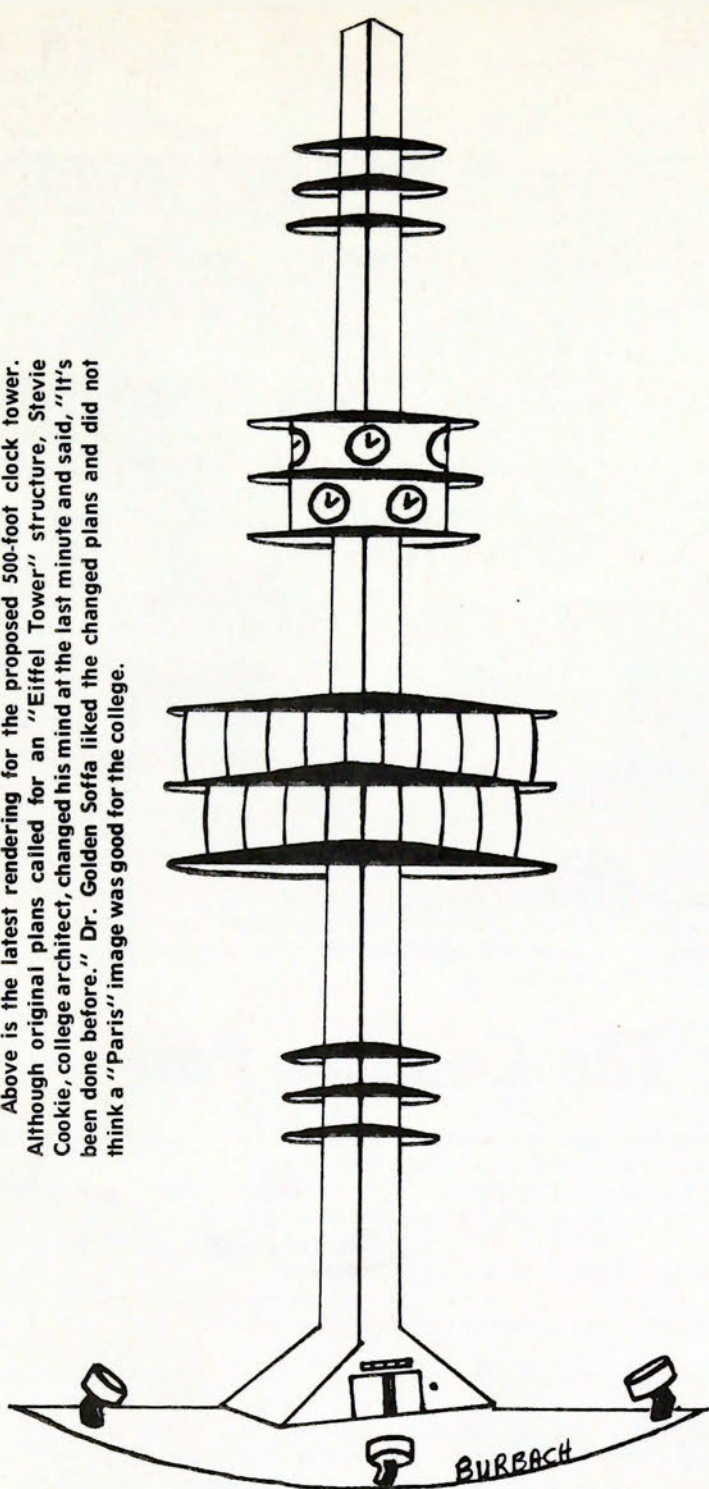
Eiffel Tower

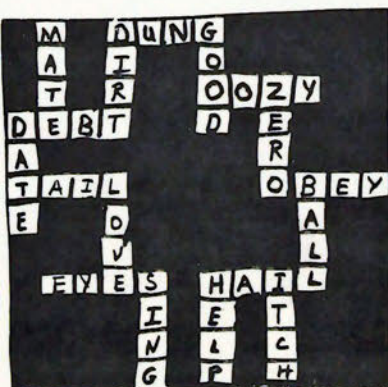

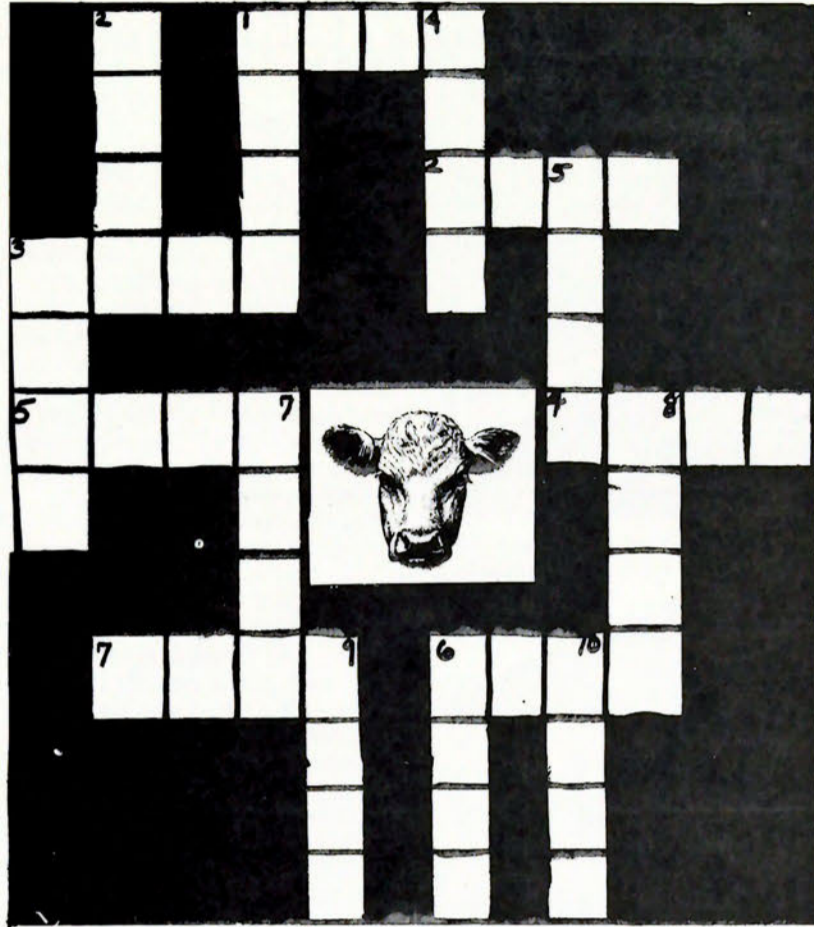
