R. and H- Dec. 18, 1888

"It does not seem possible to us now that any should have to stand alone. But if ever God has spoken by me, the time will come when we shall be brot before councils and before thousands for His Name's sake, and each will have to give the reason for his faith. Then will come the severest criticism upon wvery position that has been taken for the truth. We need, then, to study the Word of God, that we may know why we believe the doctrines we advocate. We must critically search the living oracles of Jehovah."

R. and H.- Dec. 11, 1888

"Have you that intensity of seal, that piety and devotion, which will enable you to stand when opposition is brot upon you? If God has ever spoken by me the time will come when we shall be brot before councils, and every position of truth which we hold will be severely criticised. The time that we are now allowing to go to waste should be devoted to the charge God has given us, of preparing for the approaching crisis. Much time should be spent in prayer that our garments of character may be washed and made white in the blood of the Lamb."

"In the day of fierce trial He will say: 'Come, My people, enter thou into thy chambers, and shut thy doors about the; hide thyself as it were for a little moment; until the indignation be overpast.' "A Great crisis awaits the people of God. Very soon our nation will attempt to force upon all the observance of the first day of the week as a sacred day. In doing this, they will not scruple to compel men, against the voice of their own conscience, to observe the day the nation declares to be the Sabbath. In view of this, there must be, among God's commandmentkeeping people, more spirituality and a deeper consecration to ^God, and a zeal in His work that has never yet been reached, to hold aloft the banner of God's truth. When declension and danger threaten the church, there will be more praying, more fasting be the faithful few, and the Lord will answer the prayers offered to Him in sincerity, and at the same time He will come forth as an Avenger because of the guiltiness of of the evil workers. He will be a Protector for 'He will avenge His Own elect which cry day and night unto Him, the He bear long with them.'"

"There is a work to be done for this time, in fitting a people to stand in the day of trouble, and all must act their part in this work. They must be clothed with the righteousness of Christ and be so fortified by the truth that the delusions of Satan shall not be accepted by them as genuine manifestations of the power of God. Years have been lost but will you now awake?

R. and H.- Aug. 22, 1893

"The whole world is to be stirred with enmity against Seventh-Day Adventists because they will not yield homage to the papacy by honoring Sunday the institution of this antichristian power. It is the purpose of Satan to cause them to be blotted from the earth, in order that his supremacy of the world may not be disputed."

R. and H.- June 15, 1897

"Instead of those who have the light of truth allowing jealousy and evil-surmisings to come in and weaken their love and union one with another, their united prayers should ascend to heaven for the Lord to arise and put an end to the violence and abuse which are practised in our world. More prayer and less talk is what God desires, and it would make His people a tower of strength."

R. and H.- Dec. 24, 1889

"Instead of increased power as we enter the perils of the last days, weakness, dissension, and strife for supremacy, are apparent. But if we had a connection with the God of heaven, we should be mighty in Him, and yet we would talk with all lowliness of mind, having self hid in Jesus. But now both spiritual and natural feebleness and death are depriving us of workers. God alone, by His Holy Spirit, and arouse us from the slumber of death."

"The Bible will be open from house to house, and men and women will find access to these homes and minds will be opened to receive the Word of God. And when the crisis comes, many will be prepared to make right decisions even in the face of the formidable difficulties that will be brot about thru the deceptive mirables of Satan. Altho these will confess the truth and become workers for Christ at the eleventh hour, they will receive equal wages with those who have wrot thru the whole day. There will be an army of steadfast believers who will stand as firm as a rock thru the last test. But where in that army are those who have been standard-bearers? Where are those whose voices have sounded in proclaiming the truth to the sinning? Some of them are not there. We look for them, but in the time of shaking they have been unable to stand and have passed over to the enemy's rank..... We need now the courage of God's faithful servants of eld; not one wavering, uncertain note should come from the watcher's trumpets."

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"The Word of God plainly declares that His law is to be scorned, trampled down, by the world. There will be an extraordinary prevalence of iniquity. The professed protestant world will form a confederacy with the man of sin, and the church and the world will be in corrupt harmony. Here the great crisis is coming upon the world.. The Scriptures teach that popery is to regain its lost supremacy, that the fires of persecution will be rekindled thru the time-serving concessions of the so-called protestant world. In this time of peril we can stand only as we have the truth and the power of God. Men can know the truth only by being themselves partakers of the divine nature. We have need now for more than human wisdom in reading and searching the scriptures; and if we come to God's work with humble hearts, He will raise up a standard for us against the lawless element."

"The crisis is now upon us. The battle is to be waged between the Christianity of the Bible and the Christianity of human tradition. Is there not a criminal neglect in our present sleepy condition? There must be a decided advance movement among us. We must show to the world that we recognize, in the events that are now taking place in connection with the National Reform Movement, the fulfillment of prophecy."

R. and H.- Dec. 18, 1888

"Some think that because it has been revealed in prophecy that our nation shall restrict the consciences of men, it must surely come; and that as we make an effort to preserve our liberty, we shall be acting the part of unfaithful servants, and thus come under the condemnation of God. This peril now threatens the people of God; and what are we going to do? Can we not assist in lifting the standard and in calling to the front those who have a regard for their religious rights and privileges? God calls upon us to awake."

R. and H.- Dec. 11, 1888

"The prophet saw four angels standing on the four corners of the earth holding the four winds of the earth, that they should not blow on the earth nor on the sea, nor on any tree. Another angel ascending from the east cried to them saying, 'Hurt not the earth neither the sea, nor the trees till we have sealed the servants of our God in their foreheads.' This points out the work we now have to do, which is to cry to God for the angels to hold the four winds until missionaries be sent to all parts of the world, and shall have proclaimed the warning against disobeying the law of Jehovah."

But if the subject of religious legislation is judiciously and intelligently lain before the people, and they see that thru Sunday enforcement the Roman apostasy would be re-enacted by the Christian world, and that the tyranny of past ages would be repeated, then, whatever comes, we shall have done our duty."

"God is going to bring around a condition of things where the good men and women in authority will have an opportunity to know what is truth indeed, and because the people will not bow the knee to the image, and receive the mark of the beast in the hand or in the forehead, but will stand to the truth to compel the conscience."

R. and H.- Dec. 24, 1889

The watchmen have been asleep but may God grant that they may not sleep the sleep of death. Let all who are standing upon the walls of Zion give the trumpet a certain sound. It is a solemn time for God's people, but if they stand close to the bleeding side of Jesus He will be their defense. He will open ways that the message of light may come to great men, to authors, and law-makers. They will have opportunities of which you do not dream, and some of them will boldly advocate the claims of God's downtrodden law."

"Let not the commandment-keeping people of God be silent at this time, as tho we gracefully accepted the situation. There is the prospect before us of waging a continuous war at the risk of imprisonment, of losing property and even life itself, to defend the law of God, which is being made void by the laws of men. This Bible text will be quoted to us, 'Let every soul be subject to the higher powers. The powers that be are ordained of God.'"

"The time is coming when we shall be separated and scattered, and each of us will have to stand without the privilege of communion with those of like precious faith."

"There will be women who will become tempters, and who will do their best to attract and win the attention of men to themselves. First, they will seek to win their sympathy, next their affection, and then to induce them to break God's holy law."

"When the legislature frames laws that exalt the first day of the week, and put it in the place of the seventh day, the device of Satan will be perfected."

"Satan... will come impersonating Jesus Christ, working mighty miracles, and men will fall down and worship him as Jesus Christ. We shall be commanded to worship this being, whom the world will glorify."

"Now, just now, is our time to work in foreign countries. As America, the land of religious liberty, shall unite with the papacy in forcing the consciences of men to honor the false Sabbath, the people of every country on the globe will be led to follow her example."

R. and H.- March 9, 1886

"There is one pointed in prophecy as the man of sin. He

is the representative of satan. . . Here is Satan's righthand man, ready to carry on the work that Satan commenced in heaven, that of trying to amend the law of God. And the Christian world has sanctioned his efforts by adopting this child of the papacy---the Sunday institution. They have nurished it and will continue to nurish it until Protestantism will give the hand of fellowship to the Roman power. Then there will be a law against the Sabbath of God's creation, and then it is that God will do a strange work in the earth.

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"God keeps a record with the nations. The figures are swelling against them in the books of heaven; and when it shall have become a law that the transgression of the first day of the week shall be met with punishment, then their cup will be full."

"There is a point in human iniquity when it is time to interfere, and terrible are the issue?...The long-suffering of "od is wonderful because He puts constraint upon His own attributes; but punishment is none the less certain. Every century of profligacy has treasured up wrath against the day of wrath; and when the time comes and the iniquity is fullm then God will do His strange work. It will be found a terrible thing to have worn out the patience of God; for the wrath of God will fall so signally and strongly that it is represented as being unmixed with mercy. The very earth will be desolated."

"It is at the time of the national apostasy when, acting on the policy of Satan, the rulers of the land will rank themselves on the side of the man of sin---it is then that the measure of guilt is full; the national apostasy is the signal for national ruin."

R. and H.- June 14, 1897

"Protestants will work upon the rulers of the land to make laws to restore the ascendency of the man of sin. . . Roman Catholic principles under the care and protection of the State. This national apostagy will speedily be followed by national ruin."

I feel like fleeing from the place lest I receive the mold of those who cannot impartially examine the evidences of a position that differs from theirs, are not fit to teach in any department of God's cause. . When a message is presented to God's people, they should not rise up in opposition to it. They should go to the Bible, comparing it with the law and the testimony, and if it does not bear this test, it is not true. God wants our minds to expand. We may have a feast of good things every day; for God can open the whole treasure of heaven to us."

not think that these men who have brot out the truth in the past were inspired of God?' I dare not say that they were not led of God, for Christ leads into all truth; but when it comes to inspiration in the fullest sense of the word, I answer, Wo. I believe that God has given them a work to do, but if they are not fully consedrated to God at all times, they will weave self and their peculiar traits of character into what they are doing; and will put their mould upon the work and fashion men in religious experience after their own pattern. It is dangerous for us to make flesh our aim. We should lean upon the arm of infinite power. God has been revealing this to us for years. We must have living faith in our hearts, and reach out for larger knowledge and more advanced light.

"We do not claim that in the doctrines sought out by those who have studied the word of truth, there may not be some error; for no man that lives is infallible. But if God has sent light, we want it; and God has sent light, and let every man be careful how he treats it. . . Our brethren should be willing in a candid way to investigate every point of controversy. If a brother is teaching error, those who are in responsible positions ought to know it; and if he is teaching truth they ought to take their stand at his side. We should all know what is being taught among us, for if it is truth we need to know it."

R. and H.- Dec. 20, 1892

"There is no excuse for anyone in taking the position that there is no more truth to be revealed, and that all our expositions of Scripture are without error. The fact that certain doctrines have been held as truth for many years by our people, is not a proof that our ideas are infallible. < Age will not make error into truth, and truth can afford to be fair. No true doctrine will lose anything by close investigation. We are living in perilous times and it does not become us to accept everything claimed to be truth without examining it thoroly; neither can we afford to reject anything that bears the fruits of the spirit of God. . . There are those who oppose everything that is not in accordance with their own ideas, and by so doing they endanger their eternal interest as verily as did the Jewish nation in their rejection of Christ. The Lord designs that our opinions shall be put to the test, that we may see the necessity of closely examining the living oracles to see whether or not they are in the faith."

"Sharp, clear perceptions of truth will never be the reward of indolence, Investigation of every point that has been received as truth will richly repay the searcher; he will find precious gens. And in closely investigating every jot and title which we think is established truth, in comparing Scripture with Scripture, we may discover errors in our interpretation of Scripture. Christ would have the searcher of His word sink the shaft deeper into the mine of truth. If the search is properly conducted jewels of inestimable value will be found. The Word of God is the unsearchable mine of the riches of Christ."

R. and H.- Jan. 19, 1896

"Another sin of the mind is that of extolling and deifying human reason to the neglect of divine revelation. Here, too, we must ' gird up the loins of the mind.' We are living in an age when the minds of men are ever on the stretch for something new. Rightly directed and kept within proper limits, this desire is commendable. God has given us in his created works enough to excite thought and stimulate investigation. He does not desire men to be less acute, less inquiring, or less intelligent. But with all our inspirations, and in all our researches, we should remember that arrogance is not greatness, nor conceit knowledge. Human pride is an evidence, not of strenth, but of weakness. It reveals not wisdom but folly. To exalt reason unduly is to abase it; to place the human in rivalry, with the divine is to make it contemptible."

V "Regard as a sin the practise so common, even among Seventh-Day Adventists, of becoming the echo of any man, however lofty his position. . . Search the Scriptures for yourself, and be braced for duty and for trial by the truth of God's word. Let no friendship, no influence, no entreaty, let not the smiles, the confidence or the rewards of any man induce you to swerve from the path in which the Lord would lead you."

"No one is able to explain the Scriptures without the aid of the Holy Spirit. But when you take up the word of God with a humble, teachable heart the angels of God will be by your side to impress you with evidences of the truth. . . God wants us to depend upon Him and not upon man. He desires us to have a new heart; He would give us revealings of light from the throne of God. We should wrestle with every difficulty, but when some controverted point is presented, are you to go to man to find out his opinion, and then shape your conclusions from his?--No. Go to God. Tell Him what you want. Take your Bible and search as for hidden treasure."

"Do not trust to the wisdom of any man, or to the investigations of any man. Go to the Scriptures for yourselves; search the inspired word with humble hearts, lay aside all your preconceived opinions; for you will obtain no benefit unless you come as little children to the word of God. You should say: 'If God has anything for me, I want it. If God has given evidence from His word to this or that brother that a certain thing is truth, He will give it to me. I can find that evidence if I search the Scriptures with con-

stant prayer, and I can know that I do know what is truth. ' You need not preach the truth as the product of another man's mind. You might make it your own."

"Every soul is to put himself to the task of searching out the truth as it is in Jesus, to know it for himself by the study of the sure word of God. We are not to ask, What is the popular opinion? What saith Brother A, or Brother B? What saith the fathers? But what saith the Lord our God in regard to the saying of the soul?"

"The Bible is its own expositor. One passage will prove to be a key that will unlock other passages, and in this way light will be shed upon the hidden meaning of the word. By comparing different texts treating on the same subject viewing their bearing on every side, the true meaning of the Scriptures will be made evident. . . Many think that they must consult commentaries on fhe Scriptures in order to understand the meaning of the word of God, and we would not take the position that commentaries should not be studied. But it will take much discernment to discover the truth of God under the mass of the words of men."

"In order to understand the truth of God there is need of deep research, that we may discover in the teachings of Christ new aspects of truth and behold the exceeding breadth and compass of grand old truth, of which we have only a superficial knowledge. The searching of the Scriptures would reveal the harmony existing between the various parts of the Bible and the bearing of one passage upon another."--

"As the servant of God opens the word of truth and humbly seeks to know its significance, its meaning will grow clear to his understanding. But he must be a diligent, painstaking student. He must not be content to depend upon the researches of other minds. He must search for himself.

"There is little benefit derived from a hasty reading of the Bible. One may read the whole Bible thru and yet fail to see its beauty or to comprehend its deep and hidden meaning. One passage studied until its significance is clear to the mind, and its relation to the plan of selvation is evident, is of more value than the perusal of many chapters with no definite purpose in view and no positive instruction gained."

"We talk about the first angel's message and the second angel's message and we think we have some understanding of the third angel's message. But as long as we are content with a limited knowledge we shall be disqualified to obtain clearer views of truth."

"You should seek to fathom every subject requiring your investigation, comparing not only the ideas and those of men conversing the matter, but also comparing Scripture with Scripture, that you may know that you do know every point of the faith. The taxation of your mind will only strengthen your mental powers for greater effort. If you are content with superficial knowledge, if you fail to investigate the Scriptures for yourselves, if you depend upon the assertions of others, you will become incapable of searching out any matter for yourselves. Your mind will become accustomed to superficial exercise and be unfitted to appreciate the value of hidden gems of truth, to obtain which it will require effort. You will think yourselves well advanced when your attainment is of an inferior order. . . Many read newspapers and periodicals and books and neglect the study of their Bibles. They do not wrestle with God in the closet for the help which He along can give."

"We have only glimmering light in regard to the exceeding bredth of the law of God. . . Our course in regard to Bible study is not commendable. We rob ourselves of great blessings by not comparing Scripture with Scripture. We rob the people of increased light concerning the deep mysteries of godliness. . I have been shown that in both the Old and New Testaments are mines of truth that have scarcely been touched."

"There can be no greater peril to the souls of those who profess to believe the truth than to cease their research for light and knowledge from the Scriptures. . You are to pray and search for the truth on every point of faith and doctrine."

"Men of ability have devoted a life-time of prayer and study to the searching of the Scriptures, and yet not onehalf of the Bible has been fully explored; and all parts of it will never be fully comprehended until Christ shall open its wonderful mysteries in the future life."

"Is it not time that fresh light should come to the people of God to awaken them to greater earnestness and zeal? The exceeding great and precious promises given us in the Holy Scriptures have been lost sight of the great extent, just as the enemy of all righteousness designed that they should be."

"Let no one come to the conclusion that there is no more truth to be revealed. The diligent, prayerful seeker for truth will find precious rays of light yet to shine forth from the word of God. "Let nothing be lost of the precious light that comes from the throne of God. Precious jewels of light are to be collected and by the aid of the Holy Spirit they are to be fitted into the Gospel system. . But these heaven-given rays of light are not to be lost to the world. . It is these gems that will give attractiveness to the gospel plan, and they are to shine as stars amid the moràldarkness of the world."

"Christ had many truths to give to His disciples of which He could not speak cecause they did not advance with the light that was flashed upon evitical laws and sacrifices. They did not accept the light, advance with the light, and follow on to still greater brightness as Providence should lead the way. And for the same reason Christ's disciples of 1898 do not comprehend important matters of truth. So dull has been the comprehension even of those who teach the truth to others, that many things cannot be opened to them until they reach heaven. This ought not to be. But as men's minds become narrow, they think they know all, when they have only a glimpse of truth. They close their minds as if there were no more for them to learn; and should the Lord attempt to lead them on, they would not accept the increased light."

"The question has been asked me, "Do you think that the Lord has any more light for us as a people?" I answer that He has light that is new to us, and yet it is precious old light that is to shine forth from the word of truth. "There is yet much precious truth to be revealed to the people in this time of peril and darkness. . . Precious truth that has long been in obscurity is to be revealed in a light that will make manifest its sacred worth, for God will glorify His Word that it may appear in a light in which we have never before beheld it. But those who profess to love the truth must put to the stretch their powers that they may comprehend the deep things of the wordl. . .You should come to the task of searching the Scriptures, prepared to accept every ray of divine light. . .

"In searching the Scriptures you are not to endeavor to interpret their utterances so as to agree with your preconceived ideas. . .

V"There should be liberty given for a frank investigation of truth, that each may know for himself what is truth. Among the pupils of the Sabbath School there should be a spirit of investigation that those who are old enough to discern evidence may be encouraged to search for fresh rays of light, and to appreciate all that God may send to His people. The light which God will send to His people will never appear light is to shine forth from the word of God, and let no one presume to dictate what shall or what shall not be brot before the people in the messages of enlightenment He shall send. . . Whatever may be his position of authority as one has a right to shut away the light from the people. When a message comes in the name of the Lord to His people, ho one may excuse himself from an investigation of its claims. No one can afford to stand back in an attitude of indifference and self confidence and say: 'I know what is truth. I am satisfied with my position. I have set my stakes and I will not be moved away from my position whatever may come. I will not listen to the message of this messenger for I know that it cannot be truth. It was from pursuing this very course that the popular churches were left in partial darkness, and that is why the messages of heaven have not reached them.

"Nod calls upon those who hold responsible positions in Sabbath School work to put away all egotism, all self-confidence,

and pride of opinion; if a message comes that you do not understand, take pains that you may hear the reasons the messenger may give, comparing Scripture with Scripture that you may know whether or not it is sustained by the Word of God. If you believe that the positions taken have not the word of God as their foundation, if the position you hold on the subject cannot be controverted, then produce your strong reasons; for your position will not be shaken by coming in contact with error. . . To hold yourselves aloof from an investigation of truth is not the way to carry out the Saviour's injunction to 'Search the Scriptures, ' Is it digging for hidden treasures to call the results of someone's labor a mass of rubbish, and make no critical examination to see whether or not there are precious jewels of truth in the collection of that which you condemn? Will those who have almost everything to learn keep themselves away from every meeting where there is an opportunity to investigate the messages that come to the people, simply because they imagine the views heold by the teachers of truth may be out of harmony with what they have conceived as truth?... "

"If you take upon you the sacred responsibility of teaching others you take upon you the duty of going to the bottom of every subject you seek to teach .. You should diligently search and compare the evidence of the word of God on messages that He sends to the church. . Nhen asked to hear the reasons of a doctrine that you do not understand, do not condemn the message until you have given it a thorough investigation, and know from the word of God that it is not tenable. . God has precious light to come to His people at this very time, and you should strive earnestly in your investigations to aim at nothing less than a thorough knowledge of every point of truth, that you may not be found in the day of God among those who have not lived by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God. . . When new light is presented to the church it is perilous to shut yourselves away from it. Refusing to hear because you are prejudiced against the message or the messenger will not make your case excusable before God. . . They (our youth) are not to make up their minds that the whole truth has been unfolded, and that the infinite One has no more light for His people. If they entranch themselves in the belief that the whole truth has been revealed. they will be in danger of discarding precious jewels of truth that shall be discovered as men turn their attention to the searching of the rich mine of God's word.

"Those who have entered upon the work of teaching, or who have been called to any position of responsibility, should not be satisfied to take the product of researches of other minds; but they should investigate truth for themselves. If they do not form the habit of investigating themes of truth for themselves they will become superficial in their life and acquirements. The opinions of your associates may be of value to you but you should not rely upon them and have no definite ideas of your own. You should examine the truths you have been led to believe until you know that they are without flaw."

The principles of truth that "od has revealed to us are our only true foundation. They have made us what we are. The lapse of time has not lessened their value. It is the constant effort of the enemy to remove these truths from their setting and to put in their place suprious theories. He will being in everything that he possibly can to carry out his deceptive designs.

(Ibid., 56, 57) "Many of our people do not realize how firmly the foundation of our faith has been laid. My husban, Elder Joseph Bates, Father Pierce, Elder Hudson and others who were keen, noble and true, were among those who, after the passing of the time in 1844, searched for the truth as for hidden treasure, I met with them and we studied and prayed earnestly. Often we remained together until late at night, and sometimes through the entire night, praying for light and studying the word. "We are not to receive the words of those who come to us with a message that contradicts the special points of our faith. They gather together a mass of Scrpiture and pile it as proof around their asserted theories. . . While the Scriptures are God's word, and are to be respected the application of them, if such application moves one pillar of the foundation that God has sustained these 50 years, is a great mistake. He who makes such an application of them knows not the wonderful demonstrations of the Holy Spirit that gave power and force to the past messages that have come to the people o f God. . It is eloquence for every one to keep silent in regard to the features of our faith in which they acted no part. God never contradicts Himself. Scripture proofs are misapplied or will arise and bring in supposedly great light and make their assertions. But we stand by the old landmarks. . . We are hindered in our work by men who are not converted, who seek their own glory. They wish to be that originators of new theories which they present claiming that

they are truth. But if these theories are received they will lead to a denial of the truth that for the past 50 years God has been giving to His people, substantiating it by the demonstration of the Holy Spirit.

"My dear friends, for Christ's sake take your stand on higher ground. Every feature of our faith is to be tested in the way that is the most trying. The pillars of our faith are to be tested. Sophistry will be brot in as it was to Adam and Eve. You will be strongly tempted, and unless you have firm faith in the principles of the truth for this time, you will be led astray."

"These who sincerely desire truth will not be reluctant to lay open their positions for investigation and criticism, and will not be annoyed if their opinions and ideas are crossed. One point at a time was made the subject of investigation. Solemnity characterised these councils of investigation. The Scriptures were opened with a sense of awe. We spent many hours in this way. We did not generally study together more than four hours at a time, yet sometimes the entire night was spent in solemn investigation of the Scriptures. . . "It will be found that those who bear false messages will not have a high sense of honor and integrity.
