Services highlighting the organization of Ohio's first Seventh-day Adventist church were held Sabbath, February 3, in Bowling Green. Guests for the special day were: Elder D. A. Delafield, Associate Secretary of the Ellen G. White Foundation; Donald W. Hunter, Ohio Conference President; J. B. Bogle, Ohio Conference Treasurer; and M. H. Reeder, Ohio Conference Public Relations Secretary.

Mrs. Edna Euler, a senior member of the church, revealed in a church history that a group was formed from meetings held in 1858 by G. W. Holt in a schoolhouse about two miles north of Bowling Green. Although the meetings continued no more than 10 nights, a group of 30 or more people began keeping the Sabbath. On February 8, 1862, a church was organized at Lovett's Grove from this group, later to become the Bowling Green Church.

During the year 1864 the church group erected the first Seventh-day Adventist church in Ohio at Lovett's Grove. The church remained on its original site until the spring of 1911 when it was moved into the city of Bowling Green to a lot on West Evers Avenue, where it still stands.

The first of eight local conference constituency meetings in the Columbia Union Conference was held Sunday, March 4, in Takoma Park, Md.

Reports given by the officers and departmental secretaries indicate that the Lord's blessing is on the Conference program. It was announced at the meeting Sunday that the Potomac Conference membership has now passed 10,000, the first time that a local conference in the Columbia Union Conference has achieved this mark.

We were pleased to have as the devotional speaker for the first session of the business meeting Elder R. R. Figuhr, President of the General Conference. He challenged the membership to "greater activity for the Lord in the coming biennial period." A vice-president of the Gen-

work in Ohio and around the world. He revealed that the first offering received at the organization of the Lovett's Grove Church totaled 67 cents. Last year Ohio Seventh-day Adventists contributed a total of slightly more than \$2,500,000 to the world-encircling work of the church.

Congratulating the Bowling Green membership, Mayor F. Gus Skibbie stated that only two churches in the city had been in existence longer than the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

In conclusion the Mayor added that he wished the church even more success in the next 100 years, "if there is another 100 years."

It was at the Lovett's Grove Church that Ellen G. White received one of the main visions dealing with the "Great Controversy." Consequently, the visit of Elder Delafield was greatly appreciated. During the 11:00 o'clock service he reaffirmed the surety of the message given the remnant church.

An intermission in the day's activities provided Elder Delafield and a group from the church opportunity to visit nearby Lovett's Grove and see the actual site of the original

The climax of the day was an illustrated résumé by Elder Delafield, entitled "One Hundred Years of Providential Guidance."





## **Old Cards Win Children**

ONE day, not long after we arrived in Korea, Mrs. Amanda Williams came to my office. "What can we do to get color pictures for our child evangelism work? It is just too expensive to buy or print them," she remarked.

This started me to thinking of some way that we could obtain large quantities of pictures to be used in telling stories, for goal devices and booklet covers. I thought of the homeland and wondered, "What sort of pictures are plentiful there yet not wanted?" One suggestion was old Christmas cards. But how to get enough?

This was just a few days before Christmas in 1960. I remembered a column in the Washington, D. C., Evening Star, to which readers can write in a request of helpful hints. I sat down and wrote a letter to the editor outlining our needs and asked if their readers could be asked to help. To my surprise, a few weeks later I received word that the whole letter had been printed.

It was not long until we were avalanched, receiving as many as 50 in one day. We thought the packages would come for a few weeks and then stop but we were mistaken. We received many for about two months and then a few every week through the whole year. More than 600 individuals sent us about 1,000 packages. Some contained only a few cards, but most contained several hundred and as many as 3,000 in one box. All but a few of these boxes came from the Washington area.

In the past there has not been much done for the Korean children in our churches. Now there are many new Sabbath schools and branch Sabbath schools, led mostly by young people. They are all anxious to learn new methods of teaching the children and this has kept our child evangelism office very busy. The cards, as they arrived, were turned over to Mrs. Williams and her assistant, Mrs. Pai. They carefully rationed the cards to the Sabbath Schools. They also have given these new leaders many ideas for using the old Christmas cards and there never seems to be enough of them.

Our original intention was that these cards would be used in the summer vacation Bible schools. This past summer 1,700 teachers, mostly young people, conducted 325 vacation

Bible schools and 37,785 students were graduated from the almost 50,000 who enrolled. This is truly an excellent way to bring new members into the church. We have many churches in Korea that have been raised up from the humble efforts of a few students holding vacation Bible schools during their summer vacation.

This year the *Evening Star* has again printed our appeal for old greeting cards and small children's books. Last year we could have used three times as many cards as we received. We are hoping for many more this year that our efforts can be more effective in winning the thousands of Korean children to Christ.

January sales records jumped more than \$16,000 over the same period in 1961.

This is the report released here this week by Elder Bruce Wickwire, Publishing Secretary of the Columbia Union Conference. The total for the first month of the year reached \$76,965.95.

I felt very impressed by the Lord to call upon a lady whose name was given to me by a friend. It seemed like a very poor lead, but something kept telling me to call on her in spite of adverse circumstances.

"I went to the home and found quite a sad situation. Within two years this woman had lost her husband and also one of her sons. I found her to be quite a religious lady. She liked our literature very much. As a result she purchased three books and a year's subscription to *These Times* and *Life and Health*. Surely the Lord led me to make this call.

"When the Lord impresses you to make a call, never say, 'I'll make it sometime later.' Get there as quickly as possible. It might mean working three hours a day more or driving 20 miles farther, but the Lord will bless your efforts as a result."

God leads individuals to take up this essential work. Then, He leads each literature evangelist day by day in this heaven-ordained work. Let us heed that "still small voice." He will lead you.

#### From the Chesapeake Conference **Publishing Secretary**

Our literature evangelists are a faithful group of workers. Each day they meet with new adventure. Each day is different. God's leading hand is often felt in the life of the literature evangelist. The year 1961 proved to be one of the best years in the experience of the Chesapeake Conference literature evangelists. More than \$110,630.18 worth of literature was deliv-

ered. These workers led the world field in the sale of Life and Health and These Times subscriptions.

The deliveries in 1961 represent a 10-per-cent gain over the previous year. Only six or seven years ago this conference was delivering only about 14 to 18 thousand dollars' worth of literature per year. We are indeed thankful to God for these gains and for the type of men and women working in literature evangelism.

Besides the record in sales, our colporteurs do a lot of missionary work. They gave away 4,511 pieces of litera-

ture, and enrolled 1,211 persons in the Bible courses. There are 76 persons now attending church as a result of personal work. Then there were 57 former Adventists invited back to church. Prayers were offered in nearly every home visited. Our workers report 356 Bible studies now being given and 10 baptisms as a result of contacts made last year.


They are Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Kolar of Chester, N. J., and their four children, Mary, Carol, Bobby, and Betty.


#### **Morrison Hall Dormitory** To Open May 6

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
