ECLIPSES, 1890.

There will be three Eclipses this year, two of the Sun and one of the Moon, and a Lunar Appulse, as follows:

I. A Lunar Appulse, June 3. The nearest approach of the Moon to the Earth's shadow will occur at 11 h. 53 m. morn., Washington mean time. The uncertainty of atmospheric conditions renders it impossible to say whether the Moon will be seen to enter the Earth's shadow or not.

II. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, June 17, invisible in North America, visible throughout Europe.

III. A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, November 26, invisible in the United States.

IV. A Central Eclipse of the Sun, December 12, visible in the Southern Pacific Ocean.

MORNING STARS.

MERCURY, from January 29 to April 9, May 30 to July 22, and September 29 to November 16. VENUS, until February 18, and after December 3. MARS, until February 9. JUPITER, from January 20 to May 1. SATURN, from August 10 to December 8. URANUS, until January 16 and after October 20, and NEPTUNE, from May 25 to August 30.

EVENING STARS.

MERCURY, until January 29, and from April 9 to May 30, July 22 to September 29, and after November 16. VENUS, from February 18 to December 3. MARS, after February 9. JUPITER, until January 20, and after May 1. SATURN, until August 30, and after December 8. URANUS, from January 16 to October 20, and NEPTUNE, until May 25, and after August 30.

PLANETS BRIGHTEST.

MERCURY, January 16, April 21, and nearly 30 December 31, setting after the Sun, also July 15 and October 18, rising before the Sun. VENUS, October 29. MARS, May 27. JUPITER, July 30. SATURN, February 18. URANUS, April 14, and NEPTUNE, November 27.

EXAMPLE.—To ascertain at what hour it will be high tide at Sandy Hook on the 1st of July, find the time of high water at New-York under July 1st, which is 7.10 a. m., then subtract 40 minutes, as found in table under Sandy Hook, and we have 6.30 a. m. as the hour of high water at Sandy Hook, July 1, 1890.

THE HARVEST MOON.

The term is a popular name given to the full moon which happens about the time of the autumnal equinox. If the full moon occurs exactly at the time of the equinox, it will rise nearly full about the same time of sunset for several evenings together. Sir John Herschel, in his "Outlines," defined the harvest moon as the full moon which happens on or nearest to September 21st, because it rises from night to night after the full more nearly after sunset than any other full moon in the year, and is therefore favorable for evening work in carrying in the late crops.

In addition to the above more or less regular sizes, manufacturers are accustomed to have made to order any special sizes which best accommodate them.

Paper is made from any substance containing cellular tissue, as cotton, linen, straw, wood, etc. It was first made in Egypt, some writers claiming as early as 2500 years B. C. Manufactories for exportation existed in Memphis 700 years B. C. The lower part of the stem of the papyrus plant was used, from which name "paper" is derived. During the first century the Chinese manufactured paper from silk, and in the third century from cotton. Linen and cotton rags were first used in the manufacture of paper by the Moors in Spain during the eleventh century.

A sheet of paper folded once, making *two* leaves, or four pages, is called a Folio. A book made of sheets thus folded is called a Folio. When so folded that each sheet makes *four* leaves, it is called a Quarto; when so folded as to make *eight* leaves, an Octavo, or 8vo; *twelve* leaves, a Duodecimo, or ramo; *sixteen* leaves, a 16mo; *twenty-four*, *thirty-two*, and *forty-eight* leaves, a 24mo, 32mo, or 48mo, respectively.

DIVISIONS OF TIME.

A *Solar Day* is measured by the rotation of the earth upon its axis, and is of different lengths, owing to the ellipticity of the earth's orbit and other causes; but a mean solar day, recorded by the time-piece, is twenty-four hours long. An *Astronomical Day* begins at noon, and is counted from the first to the twenty-fourth hour. A *Civil Day* begins at midnight, and is counted from the first to the twelfth hour, when it is counted again from the first to the twelfth hour. A *Nautical Day* is counted as a Civil Day, but begins, like an Astronomical Day, from noon.

A *Calendar Month* varies in length from 28 to 31 days. A *Mean Lunar Month* is 29 days, 12 hours, 44 minutes, 2 seconds and 5.24 thirds.

A *Year* is divided into 365 days. A *Solar Year*, which is the time occupied by the Sun in passing from one Vernal Equinox to another, consists of 365.24244 solar days, or 365 days, 5 hours, 48 minutes, and 49.536 seconds. A *Julian Year* is 365 days. A *Gregorian Year* is 365.2425 days; every fourth year is *Bissextile*, or Leap Year, and is 366 days. The error of Gregorian computation amounts only to one day in 3571.4286 years.



DOMESTIC POSTAGE.

FIRST CLASS.—Letters and all written matter, whether sealed or unsealed, and all other matter sealed, nailed, sewed, tied, or fastened in any manner so that it cannot be easily examined, **two cents per ounce** or fraction thereof. A "Special Delivery" ten-cent stamp when attached to a letter, in addition to the lawful postage, shall entitle the letter to immediate delivery at or within one mile of any post-office. Postal cards, one cent each.

SECOND CLASS.—All regular newspapers, magazines, and other periodicals issued at intervals not exceeding three months; the postage is **one cent for each four ounces**, payable by postage stamps.

THIRD CLASS.—Embraces **printed books**, pamphlets, circulars, engravings, lithographs, proof-sheets and manuscript accompanying the same, and all matter of the same general character, and not having the character of personal correspondence. Circulars produced by hektograph or similar process, or by electric pen, are rated as third class. The limit of weight for mail matter of the third class is four pounds, except in the case of single books exceeding that weight. The rate of postage on mail matter of the third class is **one cent for each two ounces** or fraction thereof.

FOURTH CLASS.—All mailable matter not included in the three preceding classes, which is so prepared for mailing as to be easily taken from the wrapper and examined. Rate, **one cent per ounce** or fraction thereof, except seeds, roots, cuttings, bulbs, plants and scions, which are 1 c. per 2 ozs. Limit of weight, 4 lbs. Full prepayment compulsory. Liquids, and other like injurious matter, not admitted except under conditions which may be learned at any post-office.

Direct your mail matter to a post-office, writing the name of the *State* plainly; and if to a city, add the street and number or post-office box of the person addressed. Matter not addressed to a post-office cannot be forwarded. Write or print your name and address, and the contents, if a package, upon the upper left-hand corner of all mail matter. This will insure its immediate return to you for correction, if improperly addressed or insufficiently paid; and if it is not called for at destination, it can be returned to you without going to the Dead Letter office. If a letter, it will be returned free. Register all valuable letters and packages. **Registry fee, ten cents**, which, with the postage, must be fully prepaid.

POSTAL NOTE AND MONEY ORDER FEES.—Postal notes, three cents each, in denominations of \$4.99 and less, payable to bearer. Such notes are invalid upon the expiration of three months from the last day of the month of issue, but the holder can after that time get it renewed at the Department at Washington, upon payment of a fee of three cents. For Money Orders in denominations of \$100 or less, the following fees are charged: Orders not exceeding \$5, 5 c.; over \$5 to \$10, 8 c.; \$10 to \$15, 10 c.; \$15 to \$30, 15 c.; \$30 to \$40, 20 c.; \$40 to \$50, 25 c.; \$50 to \$60, 30 c.; \$60 to \$70, 35 c.; \$70 to \$80, 40 c.; \$80 to \$100, 45 c.



FOREIGN POSTAGE.

To all parts of the Universal Postal Union (embracing nearly every civilized country):

On **LETTERS**, **five cents for each half ounce** or fraction thereof—prepayment optional. Double rates are collected on delivery of unpaid or short-paid letters.

On newspapers, books, pamphlets, photographs, sheet music, maps, engravings, and similar printed matter, **one cent for each two ounces** or fraction thereof.

To **CANADA** (including Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Manitoba, and Prince Edward Island): **LETTERS**, **two cents for each ounce** or fraction thereof; **Books**, **Circulars**, and similar printed matter, **one cent for each two ounces** or fraction thereof; **SECOND CLASS MATTER**, same as in the United States; **SAMPLES** and **MERCHANDISE**, **one cent per ounce**. Packages must not exceed 4 lbs. 6 ozs. in weight—prepayment compulsory.

To **AUSTRALIA** (except New South Wales, Queensland, and Victoria) *via* San Francisco: On **LETTERS**, **five cents for each half ounce** or fraction thereof; on **NEWSPAPERS**, **two cents each**—prepayment compulsory.

To **MEXICO**: Letters, Postal Cards, and printed matter, same rates as in the United States. **SAMPLES**, **one cent per ounce**; **MERCHANDISE** other than Samples can only be sent by Parcel Post.

LIMITS OF SIZE AND WEIGHT: Packages of samples of merchandise to the countries named above (except Great Britain, France, Belgium, and Switzerland) must not exceed 8¾ ounces in weight, nor measure more than 8 inches in length, 4 inches in breadth, and 2 inches in depth; and packages of printed matter must not exceed 4 lbs. 6 oz. in weight. Packages of merchandise samples to Great Britain, France, Belgium, and Switzerland, are limited to 12 ounces in weight, 12 inches in length, 8 inches in width, and 4 inches in depth. Packages of printed matter to Germany and Great Britain are limited to 2 feet in length and 1 foot in each other dimension.

INTERNATIONAL OR FOREIGN MONEY-ORDER FEES.

On Algeria, Belgium, British India, Cape Colony, Constantinople, Denmark, Dominion of Canada, Egypt, England, France, German Empire, Hong Kong, Ireland, Italy, Jamaica, Japan, Newfoundland, New South Wales, New Zealand, Portugal, Sandwich Islands, Scotland, Shanghai, Sweden, Switzerland, Tasmania, Victoria.

For sums not exceeding \$10	10 cents.
Over \$10 and not exceeding \$20	20 cents.
Over \$20 and not exceeding \$30	30 cents.
Over \$30 and not exceeding \$40	40 cents.
Over \$40 and not exceeding \$50	50 cents.

Geo. sat up part of the night and Della from twelve till four, and then I got up. Her rest quite well but was worse in the morning. Had to have his pillow turned often. His hands and feet are turning purple, and he says his knees burn like fire. While sitting up with him this morning he spoke about what I should do, and said he didn't want me to go to B. G. and work for students. I asked him what I should do, and he said the way would be opened. He changed his clothes, and he said, "Now I am ready to die. Poor suffering darling."

SATURDAY 2.

Bro. States sat up till twelve o'clock, George then got up. He was restless, about 2 o'clock I heard him groan and I got up. He suffered terribly with his limbs. We finished packing, and disposing of our things and had the funeral at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. Beautiful flowers were provided for his casket, and for the church. My poor darling looks so natural and good. Bro. Matteson preached. We bid our friends farewell and took the train.

AUGUST, TUESDAY 5, 1890.

To our dismay we found on leaving Denver last evening that the casket was left behind through the carelessness of the baggageman. Oh, how sad we have felt. I feel most sorry for poor Geo. We got a telegram saying he would be sent by telephone which raised our hopes, but on arriving at C. Bluffs found it was 9 hours late which made it no better for us. We have felt badly enough in such circumstances. Stayed at Planters hotel over night.

WEDNESDAY 6.

This morning the casket arrived. We wait at C. B. till 1.30 P. M. Took the train and traveled all night. The cars were very crowded, so did not get much rest.

AUGUST, THURSDAY 7. 1890.

Arrived in Chicago this morning. Geo. came and said we had but little time to get on the train, and in our hurry left pictures, Geo. went back, and I went to Milwaukee alone. Today my precious one was laid to rest on his birthday. S. S. Smith preached, Mr. Brass had charge of funeral. The singing was good, and they spoke a while after the sermon. The songs were on pages 930, 954, and No. 970. The church was crowded, and after taking the last look at the dear face, the procession formed. It was nearly half a mile long. So we laid him away, and left him alone till Jesus comes to give back his precious life. We had an interesting talk in the evening, I am thankful he is spared the troubles SUNDAY 10. of the last days.

O. A. and friends left early this morning to attend Ella's funeral. Friends have been leaving all day, and it seems so desolate and lonely. Ben gave me five dollars before he left. Mother and I were left all alone when night came.
