CARSON CITY S.D.A. CHURCH HISTORY

- The Carson City S.B.A. Church was organized June 20, 1875 by Elder A. O. Burrill. On that date 19 members were baptized by Elder E. H. Root and three others foined by letter and vote making 22 charter members. Before the end of 1875 there were 36 members. An Elder Van Deusen labored here in this area in the fall of 1874 and he is mentioned from time to time as returning to the C.C. Church as lete as 1906. Also Elder E. H. Root returned in 1894.
- On August 21,1876 "the church commenced building a meeting house". Prior to this the group met at the school (some at the Blackner School) and different homes for services. In the notes theservices were held at the "meeting house". Some of the lumber for this church edifice came from the J. W. Miner (Mrs. DeVries grandfarents) farm south of town. This farm was later owned by the Ernest Coble family who attended church here.
 - Other gatherings of S.D.A. Isin this area, Dec. 7.;875there was a meeting in North Shade (Gratiot County) with Elders D. M. Canright, A. O. Burrill, and J. Sisely present. It was thought best to have one organization, but have a branch at North Shade three-fourths the time.

There was a Matherton church for in Dec, 1876 "Brother J. A. Salyer was taken into the church by a letterffom the Materton Church. Also in May 1895 transferred to the Matherton Church. Also the Fenn's and Dow's and later the Wood's came from Matherton.

In S.S. notes a company from Crystl visited our churchand somefrom Carson went there.

There is mention of a district meeting at Summer. A little aold unused S.D.A. Church still stands there today.

One of our older members can recall going to Bushnell (over toward Fenwick) for services.

The Ola Church united with the Carson City Church in1970. Elder Loughburrough was here at the time the Ola Church was built eighty years ago in 1895. Gertrude Sutton-Eggert's father, J. Sutton, donated the land which was to revert back to the owner if no longer used for a church. Frank Stevenson's father (also Harold Stevenson's grandfather and Maxine Stevenson-Mosner &s grandfather) and Franklin Squares (Geo. Hayner's grandfather) built the Ola Church. They also gave the logs and lumber for it.

(Franklin Squares, I believe, maybe the Franklin Squires who joined the Carson Church in 1902 and remained a member here until his death in 1912. Also there was a Franklin Squires as elder of the Ithaca Church when it was first organized. From reading some of the early history there was a Franklin Squires quite prominent in community affairs, too, in Gratiot County.)

In the clerk's book covering 1875 to 1922 are detailed accounts of their business meetings held the Sunday following the Quarterly Services. In those early days there was much concern about the members upholding the church standards. Some of the early members were censored and later disfellowed; if necessary, for not adhering to our beliefs. Before new members joined, they were taken under the "watch care" of the church, for a white.

Offerings were taken called "first day offering" and later

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"fourth Sabbath donations". Also at the Sunday meeting following Quarterly Service, tithe was collected tracts and books were sold. They held their T. and M. meetings(Tract and Missionary) which correspond to our Lay Activities today. In reporting missionary workthey reported the pages in tracts and books loaned Loaned or given away.

- Report by tarl Manning maining on changes and improvements made in the church.
- James W, Miner family. Mrs. Edna DeVries's uncle made the pulpit which is still in use today. He kept careful notes of early church activies. Her grandparents, Uriah and Matilda Miner were workers in the church. He was elder at one time. Her grandmother Matilda lived to be 98 and I remember she attended curch faithfully while in her nineties, usually walking. Frankand Carrie-Miner-Ayars, Mrs. DEVriesO parents, had a son Ernest Ayars and wife who spent many years in mission work in S. America. Ernesr Ayars daughter Dorothy and husband Kenneth Emmerson served in Inter-America. Later now he is treasurer of G. C. Their daughter Anita and husband are missionaries in Central America.

Joseph and Alice Bennett, Eden Villis's gandparents, had a daughter Issie married to M.C. Guild, a minister. Their son Cecil Guild and wife have been connected with mission work in the Southern A sia Division.

Carl Montgomery, grandson of charter members, John and Cynthia Montgomerty, served as a missionary in Inter Ameraca. He was a Sabbath School sectary when a young fellow here:

Hubert Swartout, son of Charles Swartout, was connected with the Press in China and his sister Florence and husband were missionaries in India.

William and Ruth Evans who lived about a mile east of town had six children, all of whom were members here a tone time. William

was a local elder. Their son Irvin H. Evans was a missionary in China. A daughter Minnie married Elder Meade McGuire. Another daughter Mary Evans married Fred Clarke who was a local elder for eighteen years. Fred Clarke's son C. Fred Clarke and wife Esther spent 38 years in the educational work in Africa, Esther just died recently two weeks before they were to retire and had to be buried in Mrethere. C. F. and Esther's son Wilton, married to Sylvia Nelson, have been missionaries in Tanzania. Now they are under appointment to go Beriut, Lebannon to to teach inat the Middle East College when Wilton finishes his advanced degree at the University of Iowa in December. The Williams' grandparents, Charles B. and Jane Williams, joined the Carson Church in 1875. Edgar Hutchins, our

first church elder, was their great uncle.

Lucile Dobsoh Bobienco* (one of my early S. S. teachers) has some of her children in deemin denominational work. Also the Durward Wildman's.

Jane Allen, Mrs. Lera Ceasar 's granddaughter is now doing missionary service in Singapore.

We do not want to minimize the work of the faithful members in the Carson City area who have kept the home fires burning. You are the ones who have been a light in this community through the years; you are the ones who have kept this church in good repairs; you have been our missionaries and ministers and teachers that have served elsewhere; you are the ones who have rejoiced as these workers have returned.

And to you young people worshiping with us today may I challenge you as you have listened to what our forefathers have sacrficed and accomplished in the last hundred years to determine that you will keep this church as a light in this community. What this church is in the next fifty years, should time last that long, depends of you!

The Carson City Seventh-day Adventist Church was organized by Elder A.O. Burrill in the year 1875 on the 20th of June with a membership of 22. It was founded as a result of evangelistic meetings held by Elders Burrill and VanDussen, and meetings at Maple Rapids by Elders Fargo and Bracket.

Some of the children of pioneer church members here in Carson City have had a prominant part in the history of the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

William Evans had a son, Irvin H. Evans, who was a missionary in China for years. William Evans had a sister, Minnie, who married Mead McGuire, a prominant minister in the denomination. Mary Evans, a sister of Irvin Evans, married Fred Clarke. Their son, C. F. Clarke, and his wife have been missionaries in Africa for ever 25 years. Mrs. C. F. Clarke passed away just recently.

Frank Ayars had a son, Ernest Ayars, who together with his wife spent many years in South America. His daughter, Dorothy, and husband Kenneth Emmerson, served in the Inter-American Division for many years. He is currently the treasurer of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists. Their daughter, Anita, and her husband Bob Folkenberg are missionaries in Central America.

Joseph and Alice Bennett had a daughter, Issie, who married M. C. Guild, a minister. Their son, Cecil Guild, and his wife are connected with the Southern Asia Division as missionaries. Carl Suils passed away about a year aga.

John and Cynthia Montgomery had a grandson, Carl Montgomery, who served as a missionary for a long time in Inter-America.

Some of the pioneer and long time active members were: Swartout family, M.V. Moores, Alice Bennett, Perry Miner, Amos Evey and wife, Sanford and Sadie Kellogg, William and Anna Goodsite, Norman and Eva Goodell, and Rhoda Gallop.and many more

The Carson City Church Building has been in continuous use since 1876, with only a few changes. It has been raised and a basement put in for children's Sabbath School class rooms and the Welfare Center. A small extention was added to the rear, making a back entrance, and a few alterations have been made inside. The steeple has been changed within the last five years.
