Japanese flower arrangement is essentially artistic and is known as furijū which means a life of renunciation. Flower arrangement is considered as furijū because it means the love of the peace of nature. When furijū is used to describe household goods, it means that those objects are delicately crooked, antiquated, and frail. If the flower is too pretty, it makes one desire it as his own possession, but if the flower is deformed, no one will desire it. Therefore, that feeling of covetousness is not present and the peace which comes to light is the beauty of furijū.

Flower arrangement is an important subject in the education of a Japanese woman of high rank. However, it is a favorite pastime of men of
