## Students Will Share \$8,000 In Scholarship, Grant Funds

Thirty Union College students will receive about \$8,000 this year from scholarships and grants, according to the records of President D. J. Bieber.

"This is not a complete list," emphasized President Bieber, "and other scholarships will be announced during the year."

Four students will receive bene-

fits from the National Foundation Health Scholarships. Jimmy Banta, freshman, will receive \$500 a year for education in physical therapy.

Elma Lou Jackson, and Glenda Glaser, sophomore nursing students, and Mary Melsted, junior nursing student on the Denver campus, will continue to receive \$500 a year for National Health Scholarships in nursing.

Foreign students who will receive tuition scholarships from Union College are: Carlos Arroya, for the full year 1961-1962, at the recommendation of the Inter-American Division; Hedvig Rosenberg, first semester, at the request of the Middle East Division; Secondo Urbini, the second semester, as suggested by the Southern European Division.

Other scholarships include \$500 for Mary Hoffman and Patricia Gustin from the Epley Foundation, \$500 for Bill Swan from the Bruce McMillan, Jr., Foundation, and \$150 for Dick Dale and Dan Fausett from the Ak-Sar-Ben Foundation.

\$100 scholarships were given by Union College to the valedictorians of each of the nine academies that are part of the Union College territory, and \$75 scholarships were awarded the salutatorians.

## Seventeen Programs Featured This Year

Seventeen special Saturday evening programs are planned for this year's Artist Adventure Series, announces Elder Sydney Allen, activities committee chairman.

Lumberjack Don Cooper opens the series with his film "The Klondike" on October 7. "Exploring Inner Space," a film-lecture by Owen Lee, skindiver, follows on October 14.

Guatemala is the subject of a film-lecture by Dr. Ernest Booth on October 28. Classical guitarist Diaz is slated for a concert November 11. Pianist Theodore Ullman will present the year's second concert December 2.

The traditional College Talent Review is scheduled for December 9. The Alumni Benefit, January 6, will be followed by Russ Potter's film-lecture on India. "Man's Conquest of Air and Space," a Zeno Klinker production, comes on February 3.

A program of chamber music by the Kansas State University String Quartet will be presented February 17. "The Ganges, Pulsebeat of India," a film-lecture by Helen and Frank Schreider, is slated for March 10. Morris Barr, international affairs lecturer, is scheduled for March 24.

The Riverside Chamber Singers will present a concert on March 31. April 14 and 15 the Union College Gala Festival will be presented. On April 21 Nicholas Slonimsky, musician, will appear in a concert and lecture.

Concluding the series will be the Alumni "Promenade" on May 5 and the ASB Benefit on May 26.

Elder Allen emphasized that the programs are chosen "to contribute to the educational program" as well as to the entertainment of the students.

## Leffler, Brown Gain Advanced Degrees

Two more teachers have completed the requirements for their degrees and will receive the official document soon. This brings to 10 the total receiving degrees since last June.

R. G. Leffler, assistant professor of physics, will receive his Ph. D. from Michigan State University. Miss Marilyn Brown, instructor in secretarial science, will receive her M. S. in education from Indiana University. Her major was business education and her minor was business administration.

An ex-lumberjack familiar with America's "last frontier," Mr. Cooper is in a position to give first-hand information on Alaskan life. This experience, plus a first-class ability to film the interesting and relate all in a humorous, homespun narrative, has made Don Cooper a hit in his presentations all over the country, according to the activities committee.

## Students Ask More Study, Less Work, Officer Says

An 8 percent increase represented by 64 students brought this year's total enrollment to 862, according to latest figures released by the registrar's office.

Of this total there is a "significant increase in the number of freshmen and dormitory students, and an unexplained decrease in the size of the senior class," commented Dr. G. L. Caviness, academic dean.

The freshman class is almost four times the size of the senior class. Exact figures show 394 freshmen, 178 sophomores, 168 juniors 100 seniors and 22 post graduates and adult special students.

Of the men and women registered, there are 65 more men than women, and a total of 144 married students.

At the end of the third day's registration last year 564 had registered, whereas this year the total was 626. Students sent in their applications sooner and registered earlier in the week this year, according to Marie Anderson, registrar.

Nebraska, with 135 students, has the largest registration among the 35 states represented. Colorado is second with 125; Minnesota follows with 75 and North Dakota has 69.

Of states outside the Union College territory, California sent the most, 20. There are 16 from Illinois and 2 from Hawaii.

Twenty-seven students come from 15 foreign countries.

Mr. V. S. Dunn, business manager, reports that the average class load is heavier this year and the request for labor hours is down. He believes this may be due to the new tuition plan.

Some name problems appear on the student roster. There are two Ron Jensens, one a senior and the other a freshman, both from Nebraska. There are also two girls named Karen Furman, one Karen Kay and one Karen Ann.

Two sets of twins, Jim Allen and Joanne Allen Eskildsen and Karon and Karol Yeager, are listed among the registrants.

Dean M. S. Culver reports 260 men under his supervision. Despite the new wing on South Hall some men are having to live in annex apartments. Women are having to live out of the dormitory again this year also. Miss Hilda Fern Remley, dean of women, reports that she has 284 women in Rees Hall and the apartments.

## Chemistry Instructor Home From Hospital

Mr. Charles Slattery's right lung collapsed while he was on vacation this summer in Pomona, California.

Mr. Slattery, an instructor in the chemistry department, was in the hospital for two weeks because of a "blow out" of his lung wall. The doctors do not know the cause of the accident.



# Editorials...

## Pre-registration Needed

Confusion, confusion everywhere and nary a minute to think. With policies and politics tied up in red tape it is a wonder that anything gets done at all. Political machinery is becoming so complicated that it gets bogged down in its own multitude of gears, levers and switches.

College registration is as bad with its numerous stations and check points. Not to mention the cards and schedules that are to be made in duplicate, triplicate or more.

Not much can be done by college personnel to simplify present day political situations, but it should not be beyond the capabilities of Ph.D.'s to streamline the registration rush.

On the average, it takes a full day to register. If complications or class conflicts arise, it may take longer. The total of time spent in line by 800 students adds up to many wasted hours that could be spent bringing in the extra dollars that are needed in the following weeks.

Registration at the beginning of the year includes both semesters. Why not have a pre-registration at the end of the year? This would avoid the confusion met when everyone rushes the lines during new-student registration.

A pre-registration would be of value to both student and teacher. Students would know early what to expect. Teachers would have some idea of class size and about how many books might be needed. This would avoid the problem of book shortage and confusion in the class.

No doubt it would take time and effort to set up a pre-registration system, but it would remove many of the present complications. Many other schools do it.

An alternate suggestion would be to grant at least 1/2 hour credit to those completing registration.

## Make UC's 71st your Best

Studying does fit into the collegiate program. Often it's hard to find amid dates, committee meetings, and jobs. Scholastic excellence is emphasized at opening convocation, but in the rush of registration and readjustment, is lost again. "A good strong GPA," the registrar says; "a quiet study period," the deans insist—but this is not enough.

Union may become second-rate scholastically and intellectually unless the students and teachers realize the value of knowledge and the real purpose of a college education.

Perhaps the classes are geared only to the average student, leaving the superior students bored; maybe the professors are not stimulating interest in intellectual things. "Just getting by" may seem the important thing. Studying is postponed while their interests are put first. Library books are laid aside in favor of immaterial time-wasters.

UC's 71st year is the time to solve the dilemma, the time to raise her sights anew. Let's "hit those books" from September to May!

It is very easy to accept a "gift" from the government and not realize what it means when we do so. Our present administration is particularly anxious to do us "favors," more than the previous one, and it might be wise to decide whether the "gift" is worth the string tied to it.

## Apathetic Students Cause House Failure

In 1958 Union College inaugurated a system of student government patterned after the Federal Government. Basically, there is the House of Representatives, representing the students, the Senate, composed of staff members, and the Supreme Court, including both students and staff.

Students who have been here in previous years are aware that this system has been inefficient at times. This is partly due to the poor public relations within the Associated Student Body, but to a larger degree it is the result of an apathetic attitude by the students toward their student government.

In an attempt to stimulate interest in the A. S. B., I shall outline the functions of the House of Representatives. If one knows the mechanics of the House, he can better understand and participate in his student government.

The student body is divided into three districts. Each district has one representative to every 20 students. There are 11 representatives from each dormitory and 11 from the village. It is the duty of the House member to represent his district, and the student body as a whole.

The type of legislation that originates in the House is varied. All of the money that is spent by the A. S. B. is appropriated on approval of the House. Recommendations addressed to the staff on students are drawn up by the House. The only restriction on House discussion is the ban on personal criticism. Potentially, the House could be a very effective and powerful tool.

Students can help make the House an efficient part of our student government. If someone has an idea that he would like to see in action, he should mention it to a representative. Then he should attend the meeting to see how the representative performs. The House is an open meeting and all are welcome. If one is not able to attend the meeting, he can check the minutes of the House, which are posted on the A. S. B. bulletin board or reported in the CLOCK TOWER.

Be persistent about things you would like to see done. After all, the House is supposed to be the place where students can make their wishes known through their representatives. If this is not accomplished, the House is not doing its job.
