Capital Campaign

During Homecoming weekend this past spring Union unveiled it's \$5 million Capital Campaign project. The campaign has been quiet ly in the works since fall 1996 and Union has met over half of its goal with commitments and cash totaling \$2.85 mil-lion. Funds raised in this campaign will be used to "enhance facilities, update the College's computer and science resources, and add to its endowment for student scholarships." Some buildings on campus designated to receive special attention are the resi dence halls and the cafeteria Campaign creators, the admin istration and board of trustees believe that they will attain their goal within the next year

The Physician's **Assistant Program**

Accredited just last year, Union's physician's assistant program took off this summer with 19 students. The program began as a result of prayer and that influence is still dominant in its structure. Although Union's program is young, the curriculum is strong and able to compete with any program in the country. Mike Huckabee is the program director, Earl Pate is working out the didactic part of the program, and Dwayne Leonhardt is the physician medical director. Union is still seeking a clinical director for next year to complete the team.



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
Welcome




spiritual "boost" to the students by challenging, inspiring, and igniting their hearts with the Holy Spirit.




