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The Christian Father—a Teacher, Ruler and Friend

Though mid-night hours are not normally my favorite time for waking up, nor am I at my best, three a.m. recently found me playing with Matthew, my five-monthold son-or should I say he was playing with me.

Now I don't normally have the pleasure of getting up with him at hours only a baby can conjure up. However, I have done it a couple of times-giving a bottle while providing the social and physical support. (I sometimes envy mothers for the closeness they feel to their children and what their children must feel for them.)

But I feel that way only sometimes. Most of the time I am grateful I'm the "stereotyped" father, assuming the role of making a living outside the home. Christian fathers, I believe, play

an important—no, essential—part in the rearing of a Christian child.

Ellen White wrote much about the responsibility of the Christian mother. In our Church that's common knowledge around Mother's Day. But what about Dad? With Father's Day coming up, here's just a sampling of what she wrote concerning Christian fathers:

"That father is unworthy of the name who is not to his children a Christian teacher, ruler, and friend, binding them to his heart by the strong ties of sanctified love—a love which has its foundain duty faithfully performed." (5 Testimonies, 322)

A friend of mine attended church services for the first time in years a couple of weeks ago. Normally, his three sons are more than his wife can handle by

herself. But with Dad there to supervise, guess which three were little angels at church?

Even if Father is a good example to his children, there's no guarantee they will behave well consistently. But, on the other hand, if Father is a bad example, his children may well be more influenced by his behavior.

It seems to me that many have understated the importance of the Christian father. Because of this oversight, many men have felt their influence on their children to be insignificant, and thus have neglected to concentrate their efforts in this direction.

The truth of the matter may be that God gave Christian fathers paternal love so their children could develop a concept of how their Heavenly Father loves them-regardless of what they've done. God gave Christian fathers wisdom to judge, so children can

Immunizations Needed Before School Begins

The State of California's Department of Health Services reminds parents with children beginning school that every child must be immunized before he or she can go to school in California. On admission, you must show proof that the child received the required doses of vaccine.

If you do not have a written record from your doctor, you must give the school the month and year each dose of vaccine was received. If you do not know the month and year, please call your doctor and get this information before registration.

Schedule following gives the numbers of vaccine doses usually needed. Check your child's immunization record with this schedule. If he or she has not received all the doses required, see your doctor or local health department immunization clinic. If your

child is not fully immunized, he or she may still be admitted on condition that he or she gets the needed immunizations within certain time limits. If this is not done, your child will be excluded from school.

Your child may be exempted (excused) from the required immunizations for medical reasons or if these are against your beliefs. If he or she cannot be immunized for medical reasons, you must bring to school a doctor's statement giving the reason and how long this will last. If immunizations are against your beliefs, you must sign an affidavit. Note, however, that in a disease out-





"This ceremony represents the culmination of a cooperative effort between the citizens of Yountville, Pacific Physician's Services, Inc., and St. Helena Hospital Home Health Services," says R. Walter Quirk, clinic manager.

About three years ago, the developers of the Villas Condominium Complex requested the administration of St. Helena Hospital to assist in staffing their proposed clinic facility. Although development plans were somewhat altered, the need for local health care became more apparent.

Thus, eighteen months ago the Yountville City Council formally asked the administration of St. Helena Hospital to help them establish a medical clinic within the city. Details were worked out with Pacific Physician's Services, Inc., for staffing and management of the unit.

In addition, a federal grant of \$47,070 was obtained to help in developing the project. Part of the funds were also designated to expand the St. Helena Hospital Home Health Services in the area.
