Final Notice World Youth Congress

The opening meeting of the World Youth Congress convenes at 7:00 p.m., Tuesday, July 22, in the city of Zurich, Switzerland in the Hallenstadion (auditorium). All persons planning to attend should arrive early on Tuesday so they can be registered, located, and still have time for the evening meal before the congress begins.

Please remember there will be 12,000 to feed on the opening night, and only 4,000 can be served at a time. The cafeteria will open at 4:30 p.m. We emphasize the need for early arrival, so those accepted in the attendance quotas will have ample time to register, obtain the admittance badge to the auditorium, and receive meal tickets to the cafeteria, which is limited to serving the 12,000 in the quotas.

This is also a final reminder that no one without a congress badge will be admitted to the auditorium. All seats are reserved and all seats have already been given out through quotas assigned to the world divisions. The only provisions for those without the badge, who are not in a quota, is a 1,000 seat auditorium adjacent to the main arena where additional but not continuous programmes will be scheduled. Admission is open to all in this auditorium on a first-come basis.

Radio Broadcast Coverage of World Youth Congress

The Adventist Collegiate Network will originate radio broadcast coverage of the World Youth Congress to be held in Zurich, Switzerland July 22-26, and broadcast the reports over eight member stations from coast to coast in the United States and Canada.



Dr. Don Dick, Adventist Collegiate Network Director and Chairman of Southern Missionary College's Communication Department, Norma Young, and Ray Minner, both SMC Communications students and writer-secretary and anchor-man for the ACN respectively, go over programme plans with Gabe Romero of Hialeah Hospital Television in anticipation of ACN broadcast reports of this summer's World Youth Congress in Zurich, Switzerland.

Present plans call for five hour-long programmes to be broadcast one each day from Europe. VOAR, the Voice of Adventist Radio in St. John's, Newfoundland is a member of the ACN and is planning to carry these programmes.

Persons interested in receiving ACN broadcast reports in areas not now served by ACN stations are urged to consult immediately Dr. Don Dick, ACN Director (at Box 556, Collegedale, Tennessee 37315) about securing broadcasts on the local stations serving their areas.

"The only thing standing in the way of our extending our coverage to new areas is the necessary funds to purchase air time, procure distribution facilities, and care for staff and production costs," said Dr. Dick.

Tentative programme content will stress Adventist youth in action on a global scale. There will be an emphasis placed on the international flavour of the meetings and the church, Christian education around the world, differences in food, the social concern of the youth of the SDA church and placement of the world in a Christian perspective.

A special attempt will be made to interest particularly the youth of the church who could not go to Zurich themselves for the meetings. The message communicated, however, will be phrased in such language, terms, and interests that non-SDA youth will be at-

tracted too. Thus, the broadcasts are being designed to have inspirational and evangelistic dimensions.

Financial assistance for the Adventist Collegiate Network broadcasts from the Zurich World Youth Congress has thus far been limited to \$2,500 solicited from the Union Conferences of North America by the General Conference.

Network officials stress that there is an urgent need of additional funds to expand coverage into more areas as well as to assist in production and transportation costs. The Letter from Chile . . .

"When did you see Chile College for the first time?" was my question to the experienced worker I was interviewing.

"At the end of February, 1940," was his answer. "I went there not only to see it, but to stay in order to prepare myself to be a worker."

"What was your impression of the College at that time"

"Well, the contrast between the rather low standards of morality of the schools where I had been before and Chile College was sharp indeed. But the buildings were really in a very poor shape."

"What was the matter with the buildings?"

"Listen, only some weeks before, a terrible earthquake had shaken all the area where the College is located, and the boys' dormitory, three stories high, was reduced to only one."

"Did the brethren find a solution to this problem?"

"Yes, in a certain way. In the summer of 1941, they erected a provisional dormitory, made of wood and plaster. It is a small building, with room scarcely for 150 pupils. As you see, the *provisional* dorm has lasted twenty-seven years . . ."

"Though the buildings were then as you say, what would

your testimony be, nevertheless, about the influence of Chile College in your life?"

"It was my second home. The teachers, the fellow students, the worship hours, the classes, the soul-winning endeavours, everything contributed to affirm in me the purpose to dedicate my life to service. As a worker, I owe to this institution my preparation."

Yes, dear Sabbath School members, Chile College badly needs to replace its twenty-seven-year old youth's dorm, which has become completely inadequate to receive the young people wishing to get a Christian education to prepare themselves to be workers in the Lord's Vineyard.

We could say similar words about the girls' dorm of the Espirito Santo Academy and the Auditorium of the Northeast College, both in Brazil.

These three institutions thank you in advance for your generosity next 13th Sabbath, June 28, 1969.

God bless you as you give liberally for His cause.

History and Dedication of the Lethbridge Church In Alberta

The dedication of the Lethbridge "Chapel of Chimes" Church, on May 10, 1969, was truly a high day in the experience of the eighty-two members of this congregation. To raise the necessary \$85,000.00 was indeed a commendable achievement and a testimony to the guidance and blessing of God. This beautiful and serviceable building, originally intended for a funeral chapel, is situated in a desirable area of the city near a prominent thoroughfare. Providentially, it became available when a new church home was needed and purchased at a figure below the original building cost.

From information available, the development of our church work in Lethbridge began in 1924 with the organization of a Sabbath School of seven members. This was held in the home of Mrs.

Pitt at 633 - 5th Street South and later at the Barrington home. From here the meetings were moved to rented quarters on 5th Street South. In 1928, after a series of evangelistic meetings were held

by Elder A. Johnson, the growing congregation was formally organized into a church body. A church was built on the corner of 5th Avenue and 13th Street S. which served until 1965. Inspiration to provide a new and more representative church home began in 1962 with the arrival of Pastor and Mrs. A. E. Anderson from Southern Asian mission service and during their terms of service, the Chapel of Chimes was purchased. During two years of service by Elder and Mrs. E. M. Mathers, the greater portion of the indebtedness was reduced. When Elder and Mrs. C. C. Wessman arrived in August of 1968, \$22,000.00 needed to be raised to obtain a clear title. This has now been realized by the sale of some property and the united sacrifice of the membership.

Of the three Plans conducted in this district, three requested that the programme be repeated. All persons registered in Vermilion were successful in "kicking the habit". Twentyone of the twenty-eight registered participants of the Vegreville clinic were successful in stopping smoking, and none of these with whom we have been able to keep in contact have returned to smoking. We feel that this public service is of inestimable value in presenting a favourable image of the church before the public.

Federal and Municipal Leaders in Ottawa Take Deep Interest in Five-day Plan

The Five-day Plan to stop smoking has caught the attention of Federal and Municipal leaders in the Nation's capital, and who knows what may happen now

-hopefully great things!

Federal leaders in the Government's Department of Health and Welfare have been watching with keen interest the Seventh-day Adventist Stop Smoking Plan. Mr. O. D. Lewis, who is the key man in the department's "Smoking and Health" programme, attended the last Five-day Plan held in Ottawa March 30 - April 3.

To state it simply, he was more than impressed; he was excited. With his able assistance a weekly follow-up programme was inaugurated, the lack of which has been a serious defect in our past plans. But the best was yet to come. During the plan we mentioned our desire to conduct a stop-smoking plan once each month with weekly follow-up meetings between programmes. But we lamented the fact

that a shortage of finances and the difficulty in scheduling films was a present hurdle that stood in our way. Unknown to us, Mr. Lewis was listening very carefully and doing some planning of which we were unaware.

Mr. Lewis is also a director of the Ottawa-Carleton T.B. and Respiratory Disease Association, and was singing our praises at their meetings as well as making some important suggestions. You can imagine my utter amazement when one morning Mr. Lewis telephoned and said, "Pastor, the T.B. Association has voted to purchase all of the films that you need for your Five-day Plan. They will be yours with no strings attached, Secondly, we will pay you \$100.00 per programme to cover the cost of advertising and other materials. Thirdly, we have made arrangements with the Royal Ottawa Hospital to make available without cost an adequate room whenever you want it. Fourthly, we are in the process of acquiring a Public Health Nurse to visit factories, et cetera, in the city, warning the employees against the dangers of smoking and they will direct the smokers to your clinic." I could not believe what I was hearing and replied, "But Mr. Lewis, the films alone will cost approximately \$1,600.00." "No problem at all, Pastor," he quickly said. Needless to say, the films have been ordered.

In a subsequent telephone conversation Mr. Lewis indicated that in his visit to a meeting of the Directors of all the T.B. Associations in Ontario he would strongly recommend that Seventh-day Adventists be contacted and supported in their Fiveday Plans.

What might this mean? It might mean that if we are prepared and willing, God will open doors in this Union that will place His people in the spotlight of Community Health Service. Now is the time! We must not fail!

Snow was still deep on the wharf and floats when we moved on to the Northern Light the first week in February. Everything had to be carried down the long wharf . . . projector, screen, films, books, clothes, groceries, et cetera. As we pushed through the ice to get out of the bay we were glad for the iron bark sheathing on the boat.

The eventual destination of this first voyage was Sidney at the southern end of Vancouver Island where, at the Rest-Haven Church, the annual Workers' Meeting was to be held. While at this meeting the Conference ministers and guest speakers were able to inspect the ship and have a short ride on it. Many members of the Victoria and Rest Haven Churches also came aboard to see the mission ship.

The interesting and inspiring time at Workers' Meeting was all too short and we were soon headed north again, across Georgia Strait (which was surprisingly calm for that time of year) up the mainland shore and through the islands. In a little over three weeks we were back, having attended the meetings, held four services (one by request in a church of another denomination), gave several Bible studies, made calls in eight or nine ports, had 23 people aboard for meals, distributed 105 garments and 40 pieces of literature.

The work at home base is growing. Several additional families are planning to move to Port Hardy in the near future. Indeed three are already having homes built. Plans are going ahead for a church

An interesting stop on the way was at the Addenbrooke Lighthouse where the two families congregated on the landing platform when they saw the Northern Light

During the winter there has been four house fires (non-members) at Bella Coola with loss of life and property. From the Northern Light help was given to each
