

THE CHURCH HISTORY

One hundred eleven years ago, January 3, 1865, marked the beginning of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Ithaca, Michigan. With Elder I. D. VanHorn presiding, the believers gathered that day, "Resolved, that we enter into an organization known as Seventh-day Adventists of Gratiot County, Michigan."

At the second business meeting, 36 souls established their membership and elected officers. Franklin Squires became elder, Francis Nelson deacon, and Phillip P. Allen, church clerk. S. M. Butler and I. H. Evans, both born in Gratiot County, were the first to preach the Advent message in this community when they were very young men, and were called "boy preachers."

According to the 1884 edition of Gratiot County History, the Adventists were the second religious organization in the village, but the first to erect a church building. It is interesting to learn that Elder and Mrs. James White visited our church in the summer of 1867, for we read in Volume I of the Testimonies, page 600, "At Ithaca the Lord helped us to speak to a large congregation whom we had never met before."

One of the early members was Julia Burgess, who later lived in the home of the Whites. She married their hired man, J. O. Corliss, and they became pioneers in establishing our work in Australia.

The first church building was erected at 329 E. Newark St., but it burned two years later. Using the same location, a better building was erected with lumber hauled through deep snow by David Stevenson from his farm near Ola, eleven miles distant. Brother Stevenson also gave the lumber for the seats which were built within the church. Those pioneer days produced rugged individuals, and it is said that when the roads were too muddy to bring his family to Ithaca by horse and carriage, Brother Stevenson would walk the eleven miles to attend services here on the Sabbath. A few years later, 33 members transferred to Ola when that church was organized.

Among the members mentioned in the 1884 history, were Knowler and Sarah Gibbs, Their granddaughter, Ada Burgess, is a present member. One who was introduced to Sabbath School at the age of three weeks recalls the primitive facilities at the turn of the century. The basement, consisting of a dirt floor and

wood-burning furnace, was reached by an open stairway. For their Sabbath School class, the youth climbed a similar stairway to the long room above the entrance where the large campmeeting church-family tent was stored. To accommodate the little folk, curtains were strung on a wire at the front of the sanctuary and classes were held on either side between the pews and the platform.

Built across the back of the lot was a long shed consisting of stalls for the comfort and protection of the horses and rigs. One or two of these had doors at the front, presumably for the use of more affluent members.

Members who became employees of the denomination include, Claude White, Ira Woodman, Burt White and his son Wayne White, who became a successful evangelist. Elders Burt White and Woodman served as conference presidents and Elder Woodman was manager of the Pacific Press Publishing Association at the time of his retirement.

Among those who have given long years of service in the church were Glen S. Bugbee, who served as elder for about 16 years, and Bertha Burgess-Day who was church clerk for some 30 years. Both now sleep awaiting the call of the Life-Giver.

A parochial school was opened in 1905 in a building erected on the church property and continued in operation until 1918. The first teachers were Winifred Tefft, Ardenne May, Claude White and Ethel Dean, respectively. One of the first students, C. B. Burgess, became an employee of the denomination and gave over forty years of service.

In 1933, the Ithaca, St. Louis and Ola churches joined in establishing a church school in St. Louis. In 1956 a new two room school was built in the southeast part of Ithaca which houses our present enrollment of 44. During the years the enrollment has varied from 36 to 62.

As remembered by those grown older, the membership of the church during the 1890's grew to a total of around 75. During the thirties the membership had dwindled to less than half that number. Our present membership of 106 speaks well for the value of Christian education.

Pioneers who labored in Gratiot County include J. N. Loughborough and A. O. Burrell. Ministers who served the Ithaca church through the years include Charles Sanders, Fred Hoxie, O. M. Kittle, Chancy Wood, T. M. Sommerville, J. D. Reavis, H. P. Waldo, Stanley Hyde, T. I. Rush, E. R. Potter, H. R. Kehney, Paul Penno, O. L. Johnston, C. E. Bracebridge, Howard Boling, David Copsey,

Harry Freese, L. R. Ellison and E. E. Herr, who was the pastor during the erection of this building complex.

As membership of the church increased, facilities in the old church became inadequate, especially for the children's departments. In 1966 it was voted to purchsae land upon which our church now stands. May 31, 1970, ground was broken for the construction of this building. This complex, completed at a cost of approximately \$180,000, including the land, was made possible by the continuing sacrifice of our members. Many hours of donated labor, under the direction of builder and supervisor Vernon Shively, made possible the completion in so short a time.

We would like to pay tribute to those of our members who have done so much to make this building possible. Fearing that some might be missed, we will simply say that the dedication in sacrifice and hard labor on the part of many has been such as is seldom seen in our day.

May 15, 1971, the opening service was held in this sanctuary, with Elder R. D. Moon as speaker at the morning service with Elder E. E. Herr leading in the Act of Consecration. In the afternoon Elder Herr baptized seven precious souls.

A few weeks after Elder Herr was called to another district, Elder Ed Schneider was assigned to our church as interim pastor. After three months Elder F. P. Baerg and family arrived having completed 13 years of service as missionaries in the Inter-American Division. Since July 1974, twenty-one souls have been added to our church by baptism.

Now, five years to the day since we held the first service in this sanctuary, we have met for the dedication service. With these adequate facilities, we look forward to growth. Facing the future with faith and courage, we anticipate the soon return of Jesus in fulfillment of His promise, "I will come again and receive you unto Myself; that where I am, there ye may be also."

Although God dwells not in temples made with hands, yet He honors with His presence the assemblies of His people. He has promised that when they come together to seek Him, to acknowledge their sins, and to pray for one another, He will meet with them by His Spirit. But those who assemble to worship Him should put away every evil thing. Unless they worship Him in spirit and truth and in the beauty of holiness, their coming together will be of no avail. Of such the Lord declares: "This people draweth nigh unto Me with their mouth, and honoreth Me with their lips; but their heart is far from Me. But in vain they do worship me." (Matt. 15:8, 9). Those who worship God must worship Him "in spirit and in truth: for the Father seeketh such to worship Him." (John 4:23). "The Lord is in His holy temple: let all the earth keep silence before Him." (Hab. 2:20).
