From a historical sketch, written up by brother J. J. Wessels in Lecchber 1913 we draw the following: (Sec. J. W. p 2/2 and bec 28/1673

Churing the fall and winter of 1373 and 1872 Elder and Mrs. White made their second visit to California. At that time they began to talk about the publication of a paper, for the Pacific Coust. It was also stated b Sister White that according to the light given her, there would be a health institution in California." Sec L. S. 208-10

In the autum of 1872 Elder J. H. Loughborough and I. D. Ven Hern had brought out a church in St. Helena, and January twolve 1371 they visited Brother W. A. Pratt and asked him to head a Subscrition for funds to build a meeting house.

While Llder Loughborough was pleading for a donation and discussing plans and location, Elder Van Horn strolled up the mountain. He followed the water pipe up the mountain to its source of supply, the Crystal Spring. After admiring the Spring and feasting his eyes on the wenderfully beautiful view of the valley, he rejoined Elder Loughborough and on the way to St. Helena said: "I have found the ideal place for a health resort. There is a fine large spring on the hillside, and it is just the place for a health home."

"On the first of June 1878, a notice appeared in the San Francisco"Call", stating that the "Retreat" would be ready to receive patients on the 7th day of June. There were fourteen guests and patients on the first day. In a short time the patronage so taxed the accommodations that tento were erected for the use of helpers. The first summer's patronage not all running expenses, and in the fall, when the institution was closed for the winter months, a net gain of live Hundreds Dollars had been realized. Meanwhile, a large amount of charity work had been done.

About this time a stock company was formed to ranage the affairs of the enterprise, and stock was issued so a fund could be secured for additional inprovements. The "Retreat" was well patronized during the summer of 1079 but in the fall of that year Dr. Kellogg severed his connection with the institution. This left the work without a settled physician, and consequently the home was used as a health resort, although some few simple treatments were given those E.G. White Research Center who desired them."

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
