The only stop en route is at Honolulu, where we expect to see Brother W. E. Howell and his co-laborers in the Chinese school.

We have become much interested in the work in Japan since planning to go there. The workers there are endeavoring to advance the publishing work, but are in need of means. At the Canton camp-meeting a fund was started to aid in this work. Nearly \$70 in cash was contributed, and a number of pledges were made. 
