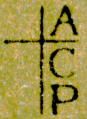

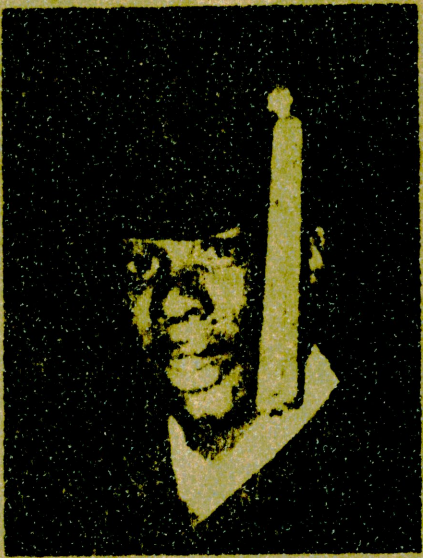

## Oakwood College - One Of A Kind

*Oakwood College is a place where students enter to learn, where the acorn of human potential is nurtured into the oak of knowledge, power, and service, and where students depart to serve.*

The worth of a school is determined by the contribution its graduates and former students make to the communities they serve.

Since 1896, Oakwood has been serving Christ, the church, the nation, and the world through education. Presently, 90 percent of the church's black leadership have passed through Oakwood College. A steady, upward trend in enrollment—over 1,000 this year—indicates that increasing numbers of black young people and their parents see Oakwood as "their college" and are attracted to it because of its fundamental religious philosophy and program, and its determination to maintain high standards that do not fluctuate with the times. Its students are from 40 states and 20 foreign countries.

The college constantly seeks to enrich the quality of its service to the student. This means the strengthening of the present areas of study, the adding of new and essential areas, and the providing of adequate facilities as called for by the quality and nature of instruction undertaken.
