Children Exceed FFT Offering Goal

As a result of the combined efforts of grade school students in the Pacific Union and children throughout North America, Faith for Today received over \$38,000-exceeding its 1977 Valentine Offering goal of \$25,-000.

The gift will be used to print the first lessons of "You Take the Wheel," Faith for Today's newest Bible correspondence course for earliteens. Written by Marjorie Lewis Lloyd, the lessons relate experiences of driving a car to various topics of Bible study and Christian growth. Samples of this unique course have already been delivered to participating schools.

Originated in 1961 by former FFT Stations Relations Director Ernest Wendth (now Communication Director, Michigan Conference), the annual Valentine Offering Campaign sug-gested that money usually spent by children for valentines be "given to another heart ministry—the gospel to others via television." This year Faith for Today reinforced the "heart" Campaign with the theme, "Hearts

To encourage youngsters in fund-raising their projects, Faith for Today sent each school red pencils, certificates of appreciation, and a surprise poster featuring a hidden valentine picture revealed only by scratching the poster surface with a soft lead pencil.

"Ingenuity" best describes the outstanding ingredient these children put into each one of their fund-raising projects. From Walk-a-thons to Bake Sales, young imaginations and unselfish labor were put to excellent use-with excellent results.

The largest monetary gift was received from Fraser Valley Academy, Aldergrove, British Columbia, which raised \$1,-251.24. Some of the money was donated in the form of pennies from first- and second-graders.







The Quiet Hour has helped provide funds for a "mission fleet" of 44 planes that has been presented to the Seventh-day Adventist Mission Board and is operated in the Far East, South Pacific, Africa, Central and South America.

'Quiet Hour" Donates Airplane

The 44th mission airplane, purchased with funds received by The Quiet Hour, was sent to Africa in July.

This Quiet Hour "air force" is larger than many nations can muster. According to a recent Air Force magazine report, there are about 13 countries with less than 44 combat planes.

These are not combat aircraft, however, but planes on missions of mercy that carry physicians, medical supplies, patients to hospitals, and missionaries over jungles and mountains in hours that would take days or weeks by other means. They are owned and operated by the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

Though the broadcast was launched in 1937, it was not until 1966 that The Quiet Hour's first mission plane, a Cessna 180, was delivered to New Guinea.

This 44th plane, a Cessna 206, will go into service in Zambia, Africa. Africa now has 11 planes, South America 5, Central America 3, Far East 14, South Pacific 4, Philippines 2, and the others are in North America.

For 40 years listeners and readers have been challenged to provide funds for missionary work in every land. They have now made it possible to send not only planes but Land Rovers, minibusses, motorbikes, bicycles, motor launches and build jungle chapels and churches.

More than 100,000 letters are received annually. Operational costs run about \$4,000 daily in this self-supporting program.

LLU Is Awarded Federal Grant Loma Linda University has received a \$37,000 grant from the United States Office of Education to develop an international-dimensions program for freshman and sophomore college students.

"Because of the world-wide nature of the Seventh-day Adventist Church and its work. we see a necessity for teaching Adventist young people about world problems," says Margarete Hilts, program coordinator.

With the grant money the University will buy books, films, periodicals, and equipment to start the program. In the fu-ture the University will fund it alone.

Beginning with the fall quarter this year, students will gain exposure to the world community not previously possible. Thirty-one teachers from 20 de partments will team-teach the history, culture, and present health, political, and economic problems of Europe, Central Africa, Latin America, the Near, Middle and Far East.

The program will fulfill most of the regular general-studies requirements thus providing another option for the courses required outside a student's major.

Language study will be an important part of the program, and students will learn to read and converse with native speakers of a foreign tongue. Liveyour-language apartments will be an optional activity. Students will be asked to use only
